WELL-BEING & MENTAL HEALTH

Wellness providers report seeing intense need and rising domestic violence, sexual abuse, and anxiety. Schools and community-based organizations have continued to meet the high need and support both youth and adults.

CHILD CARE



Historically, sufficient child care has been an on-going challenge for Tahoe Truckee residents. Now, the enduring effects of the pandemic have caused less openings than before and require more staff needed as a result of smaller class sizes. Due to low-paying wages and housing shortages, many providers cannot find the workers that they need to stay open. This also results in additional labor shortages because many working parents can't work if they can't find childcare.
