COVID Update Raul Martinez, Assistant Director of Placer County HHS Jazmin Breaux, Tahoe Truckee HHS Program Manager Timestamp: (13:20-25:52)	 Placer County is seeing an increase in cases and a sharp recent rise in hospitalizations. 120 cases in Placer's 3 hospitals, which has doubled since December. Less than 5 confirmed cases at TFHS. Mask Use: Public Health is urging all residents to use high quality masks (KN94, KN95, N95) in all indoor settings. Cloth masks and gators provide less protection against COVID-19. N95 masks offer the best protection. At this time there isn't free community distribution, but masks are widely available at stores and online. Boosters: Residents should schedule boosters if they haven't yet. Nevada County has a booster clinic once a week. Check MyTurn for appointments. 	Placer County Dashboard Nevada County dashboard	

Testing:

- Optim Serve Site scheduled to test 400/day. Walk-ins allow for 500 (but tough on operations)
- Placer County distributed at-home test kits to the school districts. Check in with your local school for more information.
- Nevada County has limited at-home test kits for high-risk, vulnerable populations. Must meet criteria. These kits aren't given to the general public.
