The campaign is focused on "fentapills" which are prescription pills that are being pressed with fentanyl. 98% of the most common pills purchased from dealers are FAKE and contain fentanyl. Panel Timestamp 20:55-1:30:49 our organization's capacity to combat structural racism, it is important to learn about Tahoe Truckee's history and the ways in which racism has manifested here.

CCTT hosted a panel to discuss the Transcontinental Railroad and the legacy of Chinese Americans. Through a series of moderated questions, we learned more about the legacy of Chinese people in America, the history of exclusion, racism, and violence towards Chinese Americans, and cultural identity.

We also watched a ten minute clip of "Legacy". A film produced by the US Forest Service. Watch the full clip here.

Panel Key Takeaways:

- Panelists gave us a great overview of early Chinese imigration, Chinese contributions
 to the transcontinental railroad and what life was like for laborers, as well as the role
 Truckee played in the anti-Chinese campaigns of the 80s and 90s.
- It is important today to recognize Chinese contributions to the transcontinental railroad and understand the ways in which structural racism shape today:
 - 1. The 1882 Exclusion Act is the basis and catalyst of immigration policy and policies of discrimination.
 - "The first transcontinental railroad is the touchstone we use for embracing our immigrant struggles and achievements. It is how we make the connection between past injustices and the present betrayals of our nation's ideals", Sue Lee
 - The 1882 exclusion act specifically barred a group by race. It is the basis of our immigration system today. Interrogation, Green Card, acts of discrimination against other racial groups came about as a result of the 1882 exclusion laws.
 - There are a lot of parallels to other groups in the US. We can draw connections and commonalities in what we do.
 - 2. There are parallels to today.
 - "Victimizations in the 1800s have parallels today. The use of the media to victimize and scapegoat different populations is very much alive today. And the echoes are very loud. We need to remember the past and try not to repeat it. We need to embrace our humanity regardless of where we came from. One reason to acknowledge the past is to give credit where credit is due. We need to link arms and move forward. People aren't ruthless" Sue Lee
 - Perpetuates racial stereotypes and shapes where people live today. Many Chinese immigrants lived in rural places in America in the late 1800s. The 1870 census data show that Chinese were 10% of the

•	population in Montana and 30% of Idaho. Today those figures are less than 1%. During periods of anti-Chinese sentiment, many Chinese took refuge in Chinatowns 3. Give credit where credit is due. 12,000-20,000 Chinese laborers helped to build significant infrastructure in the US that changed the course of work history. The Summit Tunnels are owned by the Union Pacific and are a historically important site that is being vandalized today. There are efforts to designate the archaeological site next to the tunnels (a previous Chinese Camp) as a National Landmark destination. Expect it to be acted upon in early 2023. Ultimately the Summit Tunnel Conservation Association, a new 501c3, would like to build an interpretive center on the Summit to provide education.
