	Data Walk	
Community health and wellness data	The Community Collaborative of Tahoe Truckee has been collecting data since 2007. We look at data community-wide as well as disaggregated data by household income, race, gender, and age to inform our work. At today's meeting, we shared a high level overview of key findings from the 2022 Community Engagement and Behavioral Health Survey Report and the California Healthy Kids Survey • There are limits to data. So partners were allowed time in small groups to "make meaning" of the data or to ground truth the data. • The first Community Engagement and Behavioral Health Survey Report was conducted in 2020. We caution forming any trend lines with the data as it is only two points in time. 2022 Community Engagement and Behavioral Health Survey Key Findings Social Context:	

- Our region still drinks more than the US Average but rates of excessive drinking dropped from 43% to 40% from 2020.
 - A heavy drinker is defined as a man who drinks more than two drinks per day on average, and for women it's one drink per day; A binge drinker is a man who drinks 5 or more drinks in a single instance, 4 for women. If you are either a heavy or binge drinker, you are considered an excessive drinker.
- There has been a slight increase in the average number of poor mental health days per month since 2020. The average is 4.9 days up from 4.1 in 2020.
- We have seen an increase in the number of residents who perceive North Tahoe Truckee as a "Fair" Poor" Place to Live.
- Approximately 1 in 4 of us feel lonely and have experienced physical violence or emotional abuse from an intimate partner.

Behavioral Health Knowledge and Attitudes

- Community members with the lowest income are becoming more aware of mental health resources at the fastest rate. However we have seen a drop of those over 65+ who are aware of providers, programs, or resources available in the community to help people with mental health needs
- It still isn't easy to talk about mental health or emotional challenges.

<u>Treatment</u>

- 1 in 3 adults say there was a time in the past year when they needed mental health services (up 4% since 2020), yet 22% of those who seek care do not get it because of barriers (cost, appointment availability, etc.)
- Only 14% of respondents to the provider survey accept insurance, 21% accept Medicaid, 16% accept Medicare, and 7% accept VA benefits.

California Healthy Kids Survey

- Conducted throughout the state every other year.
- Anonymous survey given to students in the classroom
- Grades 6,7,9 & 11 complete the survey (changed from 5th to 6th grade in 2021).
- Note the Grade 11 participation rate isn't as high as it was in the past at 56% and isn't quite statistically significant (which is considered to be 60%).

Key Findings

- Students reported feeling more supported at school than they did in 2018. One speculative theory is that there was a sense of relief of being back at school after two years of disruption from COVID.
- There also was an increase in the level of students feeling connected and safe at school.
- Seeing an increase in 9th grade suicidal ideation in the past 12

months and an increase in students feeling sad and hopeless. Overall trending down with drug and alcohol usage. Athlete committed program and TTFWDD programs may be having an impact Small Group Recap/Insight Substance Abuse: The group felt that alcohol rates may have gone down due to COVID restricting social gatherings and bar and restaurant visits. Now that restrictions have been lifted, the breakout group believes rates will rise. Community Engagement: This small group talked about the fragmentation of community connectedness (and influx of new community members) over the past couple of years with COVID and the dichotomy of perceiving North Tahoe as a fair or poor place to live despite other social connectedness factors improving. Knowledge and attitudes: Ths group noted the exceptional work of the promotoras to increase awareness of resources in the community especially with low income residents. They also noticed that it still isn't easy to talk about mental health; Highlighting this as well as access to mental health services as an opportunity for future collaborative work. Treatment: This group talked a lot about insurance and access. They discussed strategies in other communities that help to improve access as well as a pilot program between SCH and Placer County to help people access Medical.
