6. COVID County Vaccination Update- Raul Martinez, Placer County HHS & Jazmin Breaux, Nevada and Placer County HHS (57:20-1:11:40)

Placer County Update

- Placer County is in the purple tier.
- Testing positivity and case rates are declining.
- Highest vaccination per capita in the region.
- Residents can get vaccines at the HHS clinic and 18 pharmacy locations (CVS, Safeway, etc.) and vaccination clinics through TFH, Kaiser, and Sutter Health.
- 211 can help make appointments for those without the internet.
- Supply- production is increasing, especially with Johnson & Johnson becoming available.
- Blueshield- new third party administrator, is starting to manage the provider network.
- By late spring/early summer- all adults should have option to get vaccinated
- Using prepmo, not yet in the California MyTurn vaccination management system.
- Agricultural and food service workers are now eligible for vaccinations.

Nevada County Update:

- Nevada County is in the purple tier.
- Hospitalizations and active cases are down
- Advice is to not get complacent, we don't want to move backwards. Wash hands and wear a mask
- Starting to use MyTurn for a vaccination appointment management.
- NCPHD is partnering with 211 Connecting Point to provide regular updates when new information about the COVID-19 vaccine in Nevada County becomes available.

To date, 732 COVID cases in Eastern Placer which is 4% of all cases in Placer County.

From March to June 2020, Latino people made up 35% of COVID-19 cases in Placer County (they represent only 15% of the population). To date, Latino people make up 13% of all cases.

50% of those vaccinated in Placer County are white followed by multi race at 14%, latino at 11%, unknown 11%, and other 10%. 3/5th are over 65.

Housing and Homelessness Prevention Update, Greg Geisler, Placer County Human Services (1:11:40-1:23:06)</p>	<p>**All Information is subject to change**</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) program through the U.S. Department of the Treasury makes \$25 billion available to assist households that are unable to pay rent and utilities due to COVID-19 pandemic. The funds are provided directly to the State and to local governments with a population that exceeds 200,000 to provide assistance to eligible households. Placer County applied and was awarded 12M.• Eligibility- Placer county resident in rental or lease agreement, someone in household qualifies for unemployment or COVID-19 financial hardship, demonstrates risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability, HHI less than 80% AMI. May receive up to 12 months of assistance.• Assistance- ERA program includes paying back arrears in utilities and rent to March 2020. The program can also make future payments for utilities and rents up to 3 months at a time.• State vs. County: Placer County ERA program has more flexibility in allocating funding than state programs which can only pay 80% of rental arrears, requiring landlords to forget 20%. Placer County can pay 100%. Placer County is coordinating with the State to be the first option for residents and isn't competing or duplicating efforts.• Timeline: Program ends December 2021. If funds are exhausted, referrals will be sent to the State. If funds have not been used by the end, there may be a possible extension or redistribution for current enrollees.		<p>Placer County Board of Supervisors will consider approving the program on March 9th. When COVID-19 hit, program expanded to become more flexible and to help acute needs through generous donor funding. ● Current goal of the program is to help community members understand what they can/cannot get evicted for and to best match community members to funding resources available. ● Application process is currently paused while they better understand Federal, state, and county systems and programs coming out to help community members. ● Funds are still available to help people who can't access other funding sources.
