Data, Trends, and Issues and mandated reporting (19:35-46:00) Placer County Child Welfare Services, Kathy Tanner Nevada County Child Welfare Services, Mimi Greminger	 Data Placer County- local Tahoe numbers of suspected child abuse referrals has remainded stable, 6-15 new referrals per month. Nevada County- Truckee area has received about 10-11 referrals each month and 3-8 investigations per month. Statewide- referrals dropped in 2020 due to COVID and kids not being at school and out in the community as much. Trends, Issues Families in Tahoe/Truckee have higher needs, greater risk factors and less resources. Common issues that impact a child's safety in the home are parental substance abuse, mental health issues, domestic violence and general stress. Additional stress of the pandemic escalated these factors. In Western Nevada County seeing more fentanyl cases. In the Truckee area, seeing more alcohol and domestic violence. Protective factors like school, sports, activities, community agencies and home visiting programs help to keep children safe. With the pandemic this year, many activities were closed or remote. Reporting Suspected Child Abuse Anyone can make a suspected child abuse report to any local law enforcement agency or child welfare agency. a family needs assistance, a warm hand off is made and the rapid response team/community partner will case manage	

	 for 1 month or longer. Can help with everything the county can do (housing, counseling, parenting support, etc.) without the court involvement or opening a voluntary case with the County. Path 1: Contact is made in every case, sometimes it's a phone call or letter and connection to a community partner. Mandated reporters will receive a form letter in the mail notifying them of the outcome. Even if a letter says no response, child welfare is reaching out to families in some way. Investigations have continued to be in person during the pandemic along with virtual visits. 	
Town of Truckee Police Department, Lt. Lisa Madden (46:40-1:02:30)	 Receives SCAR Report, gets as much info as possible before going out, report is sent back to CPS to lend resources if it doesn't rise to criminal level. Decrease in SCAR reporting over the last year, typically received through school hours so without school they haven't seen as many. Seen an increase in out of control juvenile calls- Have seen a handful of teens who are having distance learning challenges with parents. Stress of COVID and co-working/learning. New School Resource Officer (SRO) has provided school welfare checks on students who haven't been logging into school. Has seen a lot of depression & hopelessness. Providing resources to kids & parents in need. Sometimes kids are home alone because parents have to work- lack of supervision. Hopeful that with schools going back in person, issues will get better. There are still a handful 	

	 that are remaining in full distance. Keep an eye on them to ensure that they are doing alright. Created a community award through the town. Teachers chose a student who has gone above and beyond. The student selected receives the award at the next Town Council meeting. One student a month will receive the award. 	
Q & A Panel with Kathy, Mimi, and Lt. Madden.	 Question- How do the respective agencies ensure an equitable response to referrals? Answer - Before response, agencies investigate, research and take the circumstances into consideration. Sometimes collaborate in response. Child welfare will respond with law enforcement. This creates less impact, less meetings, and less interviews for the child and family. Sometimes law enforcement response is handled by a detective who is in an unmarked car and not in uniform Law enforcement and child welfare have a mandate to investigate. Law enforcement wants to make sure a crime hasn't occurred. Child welfare is looking out for the safety of the child. Different legal obligations. Undocumented status has no basis. County welfare doesn't ask status. Law enforcement does not report status to anyone. Nevada County uses a cultural lens in their daily meetings to review referrals. County welfare interviews are conducted in whatever language is the family's preferred language, including ASL. We have bilingual workers who are able to speak with families in Spanish. 	

Trisha Baird, Sierra Community House, Community Education and Prevention Manager (1:02:30-1:13:1 5)	 Sierra Community House provides advocacy and support for victims/survivors of domestic violence, sexual violence and child abuse and referrals and financial support for mental health services, legal services, etc. Programs offered at TTUSD focus on Violence Prevention Education, including deescalation techniques, bystander intervention skills, boundary setting, and recognizing personal supports. Topics are age- appropriate and different topics catered for each grade. Sierra Community House can also create curriculum and teach classes based on teachers' requests. In high school, partner with health classes to teach curriculum. Focus on sexual harassment, teen dating violence/intimate partner violence, sexual assult, sex trafficking, healthy relationships, media influence and gender stereotypes. Get a lot of support from teachers. In addition to school-based programs, SCH offers youth empowerment groups which provide a safe space for students and peer support. Education for adults by providing training for professionals, education for parents (cyber safety and bullying prevention) and the community. Community Organizing- Close to Home Truckee - mobilizing community to take action and end interpersonal violence to promote a safe community. School Counselor (1:13:30-1:20:1 5)	 Differences based on age, and across the board, students have been having difficulty with regulation, routine and consistency. Some parents have not been home to monitor distance learning or haven't been able to assist because it's so complex. Most concerned with students in Cohort C who are in distance learning as their peers are back in person learning. Kids are struggling to adjust to new schedule, but they are excited and enthusiastic. Have seen higher levels of anxiety and depression and apathy, change fatigue from all of the schedule adjustments and having to always adapt. Counseling virtually isn't the same as in person as kids don't always open up and disclose things while they are at home because they might not feel safe to do so or have privacy. Prevention programs Social and emotional learning is at the forefront and built into the schedule. Varies from school to school. Minimum of once a week, sometimes once a day. Anywhere from 20 min/day to 1 hour/week. Second step, mindfulness, healthy habits, coping mechanisms, grief groups, bringing back in community partners like SCH and Gateway to help supplement. 1:1 therapist referred through the district.
