She has written several books about trauma and understanding children's behavior, including <i>Help for Billy</i>.               <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Heather discussed in great detail what experiences of trauma, stress, and unpredictability do to a child.</li> <li>○ Key takeaways:                   <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>■ Children operate in three main iterative systems, starting with family, school, and then community. Normally the system moves from the inside out. When the family falls apart then the school and community needs to move in. As providers, we need to start from the outside in to connect with a child.</li> <li>■ The COVID pandemic (and the resulting unpredictability, inconsistency, uncertainty, chaos and loss) has had a mark on EVERY child. As a result, more children are dysregulated experiencing high levels of stress or in a state of distress.</li> <li>■ Adult relationships are the key to helping children regulate again. Regulation is the ability to experience and maintain stress within ones window of tolerance. Everything depends on the situation in the home and if the children are in danger. Removing children from their home is usually a last resort.</li> <li>• Provide as much information available regarding the child and family. When writing your report include parents behaviors and their impact on the child. Don't include 3rd hand knowledge.</li> </ul> <p>After a Suspected Child Abuse Report is Made:The allegations are evaluated for safety and risk factors and a type of response is determined. In California, responses by Child Welfare Services include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Immediate contact (within 24 hours)(The child is in immediate danger)</li> <li>• Ten days (family to be contacted within 10 days)(The child isn't in immediate danger but the family is struggling to provide a safe and healthy home. CPS will provide support and resources as well as connect the family to services.</li> <li>• Evaluate out (CPS determines that no involvement is necessary, but a referral is made to the local Family Resource Center to provide support to the family.</li> </ul> <p>Reporting:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• In Placer County, call 916-872-6549 to initiate report.</li> <li>• In Nevada County, call 530-273-4291</li> <li>• Send a written report within 36 hours by mail, fax, or email. Link to form <a href="#">here</a>.</li> </ul>	<p>referrals received in CY 2021, compared to in CY 2020.</p> <p><b>Comparing CY 2020-2021</b>, there was a 21.2% decrease in the ratio of allegations made related to exploitation, a 57.5% increase in the ratio of allegations related to sexual abuse, a 7.4% decrease in the ratio of allegations related to general neglect, a 2.4% increase in the ratio of allegations related to emotional abuse, and a 1.3% increase in the ratio of allegations related to physical abuse.</p>

It is recommended in place of court-mandated services if the family does not meet criteria for Child Welfare to open formal services. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Rapid Response Services:</li> <li>○ Immediate and long-term safety planning</li> <li>○ Linkage to necessary community services and supports such as mental health or SUD treatment</li> <li>○ Coordination with schools and other systems</li> <li>○ In-home support to address behavioral needs and/or provide coaching to caregivers</li> <li>○ Mediation around family conflict</li> <li>○ Child and Family Team meetings to create sustainable systems that will help progress be maintained</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	<p>point in time, only one child from families participating in RRT has been detained. 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<p>Kaela Frank Adventure Risk Challenge</p>	<p>ARC invites applications from current high school students for its immersive summer program.
